





Homelessness and System Reform Overview

Demand for Homeless Services



HOUSEHOLDS THAT ARE IN HOUSING BUT HAVE "WORST CASE" HOUSING NEEDS.

- · Unassisted, very low-income renters who either:
- Pay more than 50% of their monthly income on rent; or
- 2. Live in severely inadequate conditions
- Increase supply of affordable housing


HOMELESS SERVICES SYSTEM

- Safety net for those who are precariously housed
- · Provides safe place to stay and services
- Transition into permanent housing

Family System Continuum OfCare





System Overview & Integration with TANF

- The District has a population of 700,000
 - ~15,000 residents receive TANF
- The DC Families homeless services system serves ~7,900 unique families annually
 - ~ 70% of families in homeless services receive TANF
- TANF funds provide some critical stabilization services
- The District also assigns around 40 Vocational Development Specialist FTEs to promote integration between homeless services and TANF Employment and Training programs.



System Transformation




*Between Fall 2018 and Spring 2021 Mayor Bowser opens SEVEN Short Term Family Housing programs.

Homelessness Prevention Program (HPP)

Works to prevent a family from becoming homeless through the provision of stabilizing services and resources while briefly utilizing their existing support system.

Avoided shelter placement for more than 11,000 families since 2015



Supportive Services:

- Diversion & mediation
- Barrier remediation Financial Training, Credit building, Clothing, Food, Utility assistance, etc.
- Financial assistance
- Rental Assistance
- Connection to TANF vendors



Short-Term Family Housing - STFH

Short-Term Family Housing (STFH) programs are designed to meet the short-term housing needs and other supportive services needs of families experiencing homelessness. The program continued to successfully exit families to permanent housing within an average 90 days length of stay.





Challenges & Continued Innovations

Post COVID Eviction Prevention Efforts



The District has provided rental assistance for more than 53,000 residents and paid \$249 million in rental assistance, \$15.4 million in utility assistance, and \$48 million in housing stabilization costs through STAY DC.

- White House Eviction Prevention Work Group a group of District Agencies, Court, providers, advocates and philanthropic organizations meet regularly together to create a coordinated eviction prevention process.
- Last Mile Payments work with court and community stakeholders to prevent evictions at the last stage.
- Increased Investment in Prevention the District allocated \$120M in FY22 and FY23 for eviction prevention efforts.

Family Rehousing and Stabilization Program (FRSP)




- Overview: Supports DC residents experiencing homelessness or at imminent risk of experiencing homelessness to achieve stability in permanent housing through individualized, time-limited assistance through 12 contracted providers and full-time employees through the Office of Work Opportunity (OWO).
- Challenges: lack of affordable housing, lack of employment opportunities paying a living wage

Future State



DC FLEX Program


DC Flex is designed to provide program participants with a flexible shallow subsidy that will afford families an opportunity to increase housing stability and prevent homelessness.



- Households will receive a \$8,400 annual benefit (avg. of \$600/month)
- The funds can only be used for rent (i.e. the landlord listed on the lease agreement is the only payee)
- Benefit will last for 4 years if the participant remains eligible
- No support services component (except credit building & financial literacy) - referral to other services – as needed
- Currently serving 125 families and in the process of enrolling 500 more in FY22

VISION: Replacing the Benefit Cliff with Uninterrupted Economic Mobility

NEW PILOT: The Career Mobility Action Plan

HOUSEHOLD RESOURCES

Maintains minimum level of household resources, including housing subsidy, for up to 5 years

Holds harmless for earned income increases to remove disincentives to earning

CAREER NAVIGATION

Robust career advising and customized income growth plan

Focus on highdemand sectors and industries

Advancing through career pathway to middle class CASE MANAGEMENT

2-generation, whole-family case management

Holistic approach to case management including life skills such as financial literacy

Career MAP is a pilot that invests in pathway out of poverty for 300 families
