What is a Green Job?

House report from the Middle Class Taskforce defines "green jobs" as "employment that is associated with some aspect of environmental improvement." Examples of such jobs include:

Bicycle repair and delivery services

Car and truck mechanic jobs, production jobs, and gas-station jobs related to bio-diesel, vegetable oil and other alternative fuels

Energy retrofits to increase energy efficiency and conservation

Food production using organic and sustainably grown agricultural products

Furniture making from environmentally certified and recycled wood

Manufacturing jobs related to large scale production of a wide range of appropriate technologies (i.e., solar panels, bike cargo systems, green waste bins, etc.)

Sample Obama Administration Initiatives to Spur Green Job Growth

- -\$11 billion in "smart-grid" funding to improve energy systems and efficiencies
- -\$6 billion in loan guarantees to support the expansion of green industries
- -\$5 billion for weatherization assistance
- -Additional billions to train workers in renewable energy, improve the energy efficiency of public buildings, schools, and public housing

Green Jobs Training Programs

Green Jobs Act of 2007 provides authorization for programs to support the development of the green workforce

Target populations

Workers displaced by national energy/environmental policy Low-income workers, Veterans, at-risk youth, ex-offenders

Target industries

Energy efficiency, renewable energy, clean manufacturing, biofuels

Authorized programs include funding for labor market information, Pathways Out of Poverty, Energy Training Partnership and State Energy Sector Partnerships

American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) provided \$500 million for implementation of the Green Jobs Act

Grants were competed and awarded in 2009 and are currently in early stages of implementation

- -\$55 million for labor market information/30 grants to individual states or state consortia
- -\$100 million for Energy Training Partnerships/25 grants to labor unions, community-based organizations, educational institutions
- -\$150 million for Pathways Out of Poverty/38 grants to community-based, state and local government, educational institutions and other organizations
- -\$190 million for State Energy Sector Partnerships/34 grants to state labor departments to coordinate sector-based training initiatives

Pathways Out of Poverty

- -Best target for TANF programs and other organizations seeking green job partnerships
- -Low-income adult and youth training in target sectors under 200% of poverty
- -Must be able to recruit, train, and support participants
- -Coordinated supportive services

Pathways Tribal Grants

National Association of Regional Councils

\$8 million to five regional government agencies

Assist workers in high-poverty communities through job readiness training and transitional employment opportunities alternative energy, materials reuse, and energy efficiency programs

Leverages partnerships with community-based organizations (e.g. Native American tribes, ex-offender re-entry programs) to recruit, train, and retain workers

Elements addressing native populations focused on Arizona

Pathway Tribal Grants

White Earth Band of Chippewa

\$3 million to tribe and consortium members

Local Workforce Investment Act, MN Community College – Detroit Lake, Council of Carpenters, White Earth Substance Abuse, White Earth Tribal Employment Rights Center

Energy efficient building, construction and retrofit; energy efficiency assessment, sustainable manufacturing

Worksystems, Inc. – Portland, OR

\$4 million to consortium

Includes construction apprenticeship, Native American Youth and Family Center and a large number of other public and private agencies

Participants will earn degrees and certificates in green manufacturing, energy efficiency, and renewable energy through community colleges, labor unions and industry-recognized training providers

State Energy Sector Partnership

Arizona Department of Economic Security

\$6 million to consortium

Navajo and Apache tribal agencies and native-owned firms included as partners

Training in weatherization, energy efficiency, solar voltaic installation, green building design and construction for native populations

Comprehensive program involving state and local WIA agencies, community colleges and other partners

FY09 - \$490 million in implementation – possible partnerships for TANF programs, CBOs, and others

FY10 - \$40 million appropriated for DOL Green Job Innovation Fund

FY11 - \$85 million requested for Green Job Innovation Fund
