#### **TANF in Perspective: Reflecting on the Past, Looking Forward to the Future**

*In the 20 years since the passage of TANF, we have watched the TANF program evolve and have gained considerable knowledge about strategies to assist families in moving toward self-sufficiency. More recently, an expanding body of research and information about the impact of toxic stress, the importance of executive skills, and the promise of two-generation approaches to reducing poverty is helping to propel a new generation of state and local innovation in TANF. Panelists will reflect upon and engage participants in a discussion on lessons from the first 20 years that can help inform new federal, state, and local efforts to improve outcomes for children and families.*

10:45 a.m. – 12:15 p.m.	<p><b>Using Two-Generation Approaches to Break the Cycle of Poverty</b></p> <p><i>The two-generation approach to serving low-income families has seen renewed interest in recent years, with models focused on combining comprehensive, career-focused employment and training opportunities for parents with educational and enrichment opportunities for their children. However, State, territory, and tribal TANF programs have suggested a need for more targeted information and Technical Assistance around two-generation approaches, and TANF integration and implementation strategies. This session will provide an overview of the policy components of an intentional two-generation approach and offer tools and resources that may be applicable to TANF programs, wherever they lay on the two-generation continuum. <p><b>9:15 a.m. – 10:30 a.m.</b></p>	<p><b>One Year Closer to Ending Family Homelessness</b></p> <p><i>State and local TANF agencies have been gaining momentum in both conversation and practice around housing stability and family homelessness. In 2016, we are one year closer to the goal set out by the U.S. Interagency Council on Homelessness’ (USICH) Opening Doors: Federal Strategic Plan to Prevent and End Homelessness, to end family homelessness by the year 2020. In addition, this year, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Secretary Sylvia Mathews Burwell sits as Chair of USICH’s Council. Past regional meetings have focused on allowable and innovative uses of TANF to address housing and supportive services for families experiencing or at-risk of homelessness. This session will continue that conversation – hearing more from States as to their successes and the benefit of addressing family homelessness, and the benefit of State TANF agencies working directly with their State and local Continuums of Care.</i></p>

<p><b>2:45 p.m. – 4:00 p.m.</b></p>	<p><b>2014 Child Care Reauthorization and Opportunities for TANF and CCDF</b></p> <p><i>In February 2016, the Office of Child Care (OCC) and the Office of Family Assistance published an Information Memorandum (IM) on opportunities for coordinating the Child Care and Development Fund (CCDF) and TANF programs. The CCDF and TANF programs are linked in federal legislative history and, in many States, through the daily operations of both programs. In fiscal year (FY) 2014, States spent approximately \$2.6 billion of federal TANF funds on child care, either directly or through a transfer to the CCDF program. Coordination between the two programs is a key part of two-generation strategies that can address the needs of children and their parents together along with the goal of improving the entire family’s overall economic security. There is significant overlap between this population and TANF recipients.
