# Rural Child Poverty

- More than 1 in 4 rural children live in poverty
  - That's about 6.1 million children
- The rural poverty rate and the rural *child* poverty rate have exceeded urban rates for over 30 years




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# Rural IMPACT Demonstration

## THROUGH:


*A two-generation approach that will address the needs of both vulnerable children and their parents together.*




# Why ACF is Involved
