Definition of Terms

- Two-generation lens = A mindset that seeks to understand the intersecting needs of parents and their children when designing and implementing programs and policies
- Two-generation programs = Offer child- and parent-focused services in a coordinated manner, sometimes by a single organization, more often through formal partnerships with community-based organizations

Definition of Terms (cont.)

- Two-generation policy and systems change= an intentional focus on the whole family by policymakers when:
 - Developing, assessing and improving policy, practices, rules, regulations, technical assistance and training, performance measurement, financing, data systems, and other components of key adult- and child-focused service delivery systems; and
 - Developing legislation and budgets

NGA's Interest in Two-Generation


- A useful lens for framing our work with states around family economic security and child well-being

 - 16 policy advisors from governors' offices




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- Participants:
 - Officials from a variety of policy areas:

 - 11 workforce and economic development officials
 - 5 health and human services officials
 - 3 health officials
 - 3 education officials


- Almost half of state participants were familiar with the concept and came to learn
- Another quarter had begun planning or developing two-generation efforts and wanted ideas about what more they could do
- Another 22% had two-generation efforts in place and want to take them to the next level
- Two officials were not familiar with twogeneration

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States' Emerging Ideas

- Connect Workforce Investment Boards to child care
- Better link TANF and WIOA
- Family coaching case management model
- Integrate financial empowerment into adultand child-serving programs
- Centralized and presumptive eligibility determination for TANF, SNAP, Medicaid

Two-Gen Opportunities in TANF

Think of TANF in three ways:

- 1. The **people**: target for more holistic services; prioritize for services
- 2. The **funding stream**: fund two-gen programs and services; "glue" funding to better coordinate child- and adult-focused services
- 3. The **service delivery system**: link workforce, ECE/child care, Medicaid, behavioral health, substance abuse, SNAP (E&T) and others

Two-Gen Opportunities in TANF: Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act

- WIOA designed to help individuals (including low-income parents) move into work and attain economic security
- Goals:
 - Help job seekers access employment, education, training and support services to succeed in the labor market
 - 2. Match employers with the skilled workers they need to compete in the global economy

Two-Gen Opportunities in TANF: Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act

Links to TANF:

- 1. Overlapping goals and target populations
- 2. TANF is a required partner in American Job Centers (aka one-stops)
- 3. WIOA prioritizes recipients of public benefits
- 4. States can choose a "combined plan"—includes TANF, SNAP E&T, career & tech ed, etc.
 - 28 states submitted combined plans
 - 14 of those included TANF partners and services
 - 5. So invite yourself to the table!

Two-Gen Opportunities in TANF: Workforce Innovation & Opportunity Act

- Possible strategic focus: Out of school youth
 - 1. "Out of school youth" defined as 16- to 24-yearolds not in school, not employed
 - 2. One-third of work-eligible TANF recipients is under age 24
 - 3. WIOA emphasizes "career pathways" approach:
 - High quality education, training that meets the needs of the individual and aligns with skills needed by employers
 - Includes a range of post-secondary options, including apprenticeships, and helps individuals advance in jobs
 - Includes career counseling

Two-Gen Opportunities in TANF: Child Care and Development Block Grant

- CCDBG reauthorization aims to better meet the employment needs of low-income parents and the child development needs of their children
- Key Goals:
 - 1. Improve quality, health and safety of child care settings
 - 2. Enhance continuity of care: guaranteed 3 months of assistance; 12-month re-determination period
 - 3. Transparency and consumer education

Two-Gen Opportunities in TANF: Child Care and Development Block Grant

Links to TANF:

- 1. Complementary goals
 - National searchable website of child care providers
 - Access to quality, affordable care a major barrier to employment for low-income families
 - Continuity of care permits stable employment
- 2. Overlapping eligibility:
 - TANF: < FPL CCDBG: < 85% of state median income
 - 14% of families receiving CCDBG also receive TANF (higher if consider those eligible but not receiving TANF)

Parents and Children Thriving Together (PACT^T) Two-Generation State Policy Network

- NGA and CLASP designing and executing a 2year TA effort with up to 6 states around twogeneration state policy and systems change
- Project goal: Help participating states develop and implement a two-generation state plan aimed at systems change
- Ultimate goal: Improve outcomes for both the adults and children in low-income families
- Funded by Annie E. Casey, W.K. Kellogg, Doris Duke Charitable Foundations

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Parents and Children Thriving Together (PACT^T) Two-Generation State Policy Network

Technical assistance and support offered

- **Financial Support.** A grant of between \$60,000 and \$100,000 over two years to support activities to design and implement the two-generation plan.
- **Technical Assistance.** Ongoing technical assistance from NGA, CLASP, Ascend and other experts, involving site visits and phone consultations.
- **Peer Learning and Support.** Attendance at two or three inperson meetings with the other participating states.
- Visibility. Increased recognition for their two-generation efforts through dissemination of best practices.

Key dates

- By early July: Release RFA
- By mid-August: Select states
- Sept. 2016 to Sept 2018: Receive technical assistance and support
