Classic TANF Child Only

TANF Child Only Grant:

- Caretaker Relative(s)
- Presumptive eligibility
- Generated by financial need
- Usually voluntary
- Generally informal
- Child Support Enforcement required

Classic Kinship Placement

- Child Welfare Kinship Care Placement:
- Abuse and/or neglect
- Child(ren) removal from home/family
- Court-ordered
- Temporary placement
- Permanency Plan
- ICWA

Kinship Placement Process

- Removal and Court Ordered Placement
- Temporary State/Tribe Custody Order
- Legal State Health/Welfare and Financial Responsibility for child(ren)
- Extended family search for placement
- Foster License and Background Check of all household members
- Medicaid eligibility determination required
- Social Workers and Case Plans
- Monthly stipend up to 3 times child-only
