Who/What is Denver's Road Home?

 Denver's Road Home is a collaboration among the City and County of Denver, Mile High United Way, Denver Housing Authority and Denver Human Services in addition to homeless service providers, foundations, business, faith-based organizations, and the greater community.

 Works by connecting the homeless/at-risk to affordable housing and supportive services through partnerships with providers

Vision

Every child, woman, and man will have an alternative to living life on the street

Mission

To create an effective homeless care system that is seamless, coordinated, and linked to other services.



Denver's Road Home Roles

- Convene—bring impact players together to solve problems, ID best practices
- Advocate—build awareness, challenge perspectives, be the voice
- Innovate—leverage best practice, ID new models, new partnerships
- Analyze—necessary to efficiently use resources

 Objective--to assist 25 communities in accelerating and aligning their existing efforts to end Veteran and chronic homelessness by 2015 – and to do this in a way that lays the foundation for ending homelessness.



- Build and/or strengthen a Coordinated Entry System to identify, assess, and match homeless Veterans and chronically homeless to appropriate housing support interventions.
- Strengthen and integrate data systems to coordinate efforts to end Veteran and chronic homelessness.
- Integrate VA efforts and assets with the overall efforts to end Veteran and chronic homelessness in the community.
