# Findings from the Pathways Clearinghouse: What Works During Recessions and Recoveries?



## Using the Pathways Clearinghouse to understand what works

#### Analyzed information from

- 1,438 findings, describing effects on employment, earnings, public benefit receipt, and education and training
- 188 studies with high- or moderate-quality evidence
- 141 interventions

### Grouped studies based on timing of enrollment

- Recession (increasing unemployment rate)
- Recovery (decreasing unemployment rate)
- Stable (flat unemployment rate)



## Why might interventions have different effects in recessions or recoveries?

During recessions or recoveries:

- Employers might be more or less selective
- Costs of training (including foregone earnings) might be lower or higher
- More or different people might be competing for jobs
- More or different people might be seeking services



## Interventions have been successful in a range of economic conditions





## Interventions improve outcomes across economic conditions

Average intervention effects, by economic conditions during implementation



Average effects across outcome types, converted into annual earnings terms.

\*\* Average effect size is statistically significantly different from the overall mean at the 0.05 level.





Average effects of interventions implemented during recessions




WAYS TO WORK

## Key takeaways for programming during recessions


 Case management or other support, employment services, and work and work-based learning interventions improve outcomes

- Consider placing
  - More emphasis on case management or other supports
  - Less emphasis on education and training



## Most types of interventions improved outcomes during recoveries

Average effects of interventions implemented during recoveries



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Average effects across outcome types, converted into annual earnings terms. Statistically significant differences shown in solid bars.

### Most types of interventions had similar effects in recoveries and stable periods

Differences in average intervention effects: recoveries versus stable periods



Higher average effects during recoveries

Differences in average effects across outcome types, converted into annual earnings terms. Statistically significant differences shown in solid bars.



## Key takeaways for programming during recoveries


- Most types of interventions improve outcomes
  - Interventions focused on education and training and work and work-based learning show the largest effects
- Consider targeting resources towards interventions other than those focused on employment retention services

Types of interventions with evidence of improving outcomes among workers with low incomes, listed in order of effectiveness






## Most types of interventions improve outcomes, on average

Average effects of interventions, all economic conditions

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Average effects across outcome types, converted into annual earnings terms.

Statistically significant differences shown in solid bars.

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## Key takeaways on patterns across economic conditions

- Work and work-based learning and education and training interventions have the largest average effects
  - But neither improves average outcomes in all three economic condition categories: recessions, recoveries, and stable periods
- Employment services improve outcomes in recessions, recoveries, and stable periods



### Conclusions and caveats

- Economic conditions matter
- But in each type of economic condition, some types of interventions have been shown to be successful
- Differences might be driven by differences in interventions, clients, implementation, or context
- Realities of economic conditions might be different



## Has your organization delivered remote services during the COVID-19 pandemic?



### Interventions examined

Intervention	Select service content
Integrated Basic Education and Skills Training (I-BEST)	<ul> <li>Integrated occupational training and adult basic education classes</li> <li>Academic advising</li> </ul>
Project Quality Employment Through Skills Training (QUEST)	<ul><li>Life skills sessions</li><li>Academic and career counseling</li></ul>
Wisconsin Regional Training Partnerships (WRTP)	<ul> <li>Occupational and soft-skills training</li> <li>Tutoring in occupational skills</li> </ul>

## Common challenges for participants engaging in remote services

- Caregiving responsibilities
- Accessing the Internet or computers
- Sharing technology among multiple household members
- Learning remotely for participants new to the experience

- 1. Staff offered multiple modalities to receive session content
- Prerecording sessions
- Offering synchronous videoconference sessions
- Providing in-person training with safety precautions
- Creating new publicly available content



2. Organizations modified intervention policies

- Lenient late policies
- Flexible due dates
- Shorter session times
- Offering multiple synchronous sessions



- 3. Organizations and partners offered technology assistance to participants
- Laptop and hot spot loaner programs
- Technology support

4. Staff interacted and communicated with participants more frequently

- More participants requested individual meetings
- More required check-ins
- More text messaging



## 5. Organizations updated their infrastructure and helped staff adapt to new technology

- Practicing with other staff
- Having virtual staff meetings
- Continuously trying new things and adjusting
- Motivating and supporting each other
