- Invest in evaluation and research




OAH Key Activities

OAH TPP Program – Who We Serve

- Reaching communities with the greatest need & the most vulnerable youth
- Anticipate serving 1.7 million youth between 2010 2020
 - ½ million youth in 39 States & DC Sept 2010 Aug 2015
 - 1.2 million youth in 39 States & Marshall Islands July 2015 June 2020



Pregnancy Assistance Fund

PREGNANCY ASSISTANCE FUND



\$25 million competitive grant program funding States and Tribes to provide a seamless network of support services to expectant and parenting teens, women, fathers, and their families

THE NEED



>229,000 babies were born to young women aged 15 to 19 in 2015.¹



Only half of teen mothers receive a high school diploma by age 22.²



At least a quarter of teen mothers report being in abusive relationships before, during, or after their pregnancies.⁵





Many young fathers face financial hardship, low education attainment, poor health outcomes, and employment challenges but father involvement is associated with positive child education outcomes.

SUPPORTING EXPECTANT & PARENTING FAMILIES

The PAF Program supports expectant and parenting your families in high schools, colleges, community service centers, and other settings.



COMPREHENSIVE SUPPORTS




In FY 2013-15, PAF Program grantees supported expectant and parenting youth by providing critical supports through direct services and linkages/referrals including: 16,600 parenting skills information, 14,400 case management services, 13,700 education support services, & 11,000 concrete supports (such as food housing clubbing fingitura).



PUBLIC AWARENESS

PAF Program funds are also used to raise awareness of existing but underutilized resources for young families and to improve services for pregnant women who are victims of intimate partner violence.

 - Self-sufficiency
 - Child care
 - Economic stability
 - Housing
