#### The ASPIRE Project

- Insight Policy Research conducted a needs assessment of disconnected youth under the Assisting Special Populations to Improve Readiness and Engagement (ASPIRE) contract
- Conducted semi-structured interviews with State, county, and service provider personnel in 4 States
- Interview topics included:
  - Needs of disconnected youth
  - Services provided
  - Challenges to serving the population

#### Who are Disconnected Youth?

- ▶ Broadly defined, disconnected youth are 16 24 years old and not engaged in education or the workforce
- Compared to all youth, the population of disconnected youth are\*:
  - Disproportionately minority or from low-income households, especially in rural and economically depressed areas
  - More likely to have a disability, including mental illness
  - At increased risk of exposure to the criminal justice system


#### Who are Disconnected Youth? (Contd. 1)

- Common barriers include\*:
  - Lack of educational attainment
  - Little-to-no employment experience
  - Limited exposure to adult role models
  - Delayed social development


## Who are Disconnected Youth? (Contd. 2)

More than three quarters of disconnected youth do not have any postsecondary experience



# Who are Disconnected Youth? (Contd. 3)

On average, disconnected youth have limited work experience and low earnings



## Who are Disconnected Youth? (Contd. 4)

Only a portion of the disconnected youth population is TANF-Eligible

Categories of Disconnected Youth	2017 Pop. Size	Percent of DY population
Minor Children of Adult TANF Recipients	127,805	3.13%
Minors who are Parents	32,986	0.81%
Adults Between 19 and 24 with Children	1,726,732	42.25%
Not Eligible for TANF	2,199,483	53.82%

#### What is Sector-Based Employment

#### Sector-based employment approaches:

- pair organizations that provide employment training for low-skill workers with employers aiming to fill specific occupational vacancies
- have potential to increase employment outcomes, wages, overall earnings, and benefits retention for disconnected youth (Maguire et al., 2010; Hendra et. al., 2016)
