Coaching has shown promise in increasing recipients' motivation to complete education and training, and other activities critical to finding and retaining employment. Idea Labs are networking opportunities for Gateway participants to engage in peer-to-peer dialogues on selected topics. The facilitator will share information about an idea or concept to spark discussion and then moderate a highly interactive conversation. Idea Lab 1: PACE-STED

Erica Zielewski, PACE-STED, will highlight the 2010-2017 Subsidized and Transitional Employment Demonstration project. This project is evaluating subsidized and transitional employment approaches for low-income populations, including TANF recipients and non-custodial parents. The project is examining the efficacy of subsidized employment strategies in: (1) providing work-based income support for people who are not able to find regular, unsubsidized jobs; and (2) improving the employability of disadvantaged groups.

Idea Lab 2: BIAS-GOALS

Emily Schmitt, Office of Planning, Research and Evaluation (OPRE), will highlight OPRE's Behavioral Interventions to Advance Self-Sufficiency (BIAS) project (2010–2016). This project will provide insights on the applicability of behavioral economics (a discipline which combines findings from psychology and economics) to human services program design. The BIAS project is testing TANF and child support program strategies that have been informed by a more realistic understanding of human behavior and decision making in order to improve enrollment, participation, and compliance of recipients.

Idea Lab 3: TANF Data Q&A – OFA Division of Data Collection and Analysis Division

Yun Song and Debbie Perez, statisticians with the Office of Family Assistance, will be available to answer questions related to states' collection and submission of data and how states can ensure that their data are accurate, timely, and complete. TANF data collection is a systematic approach to gathering information on the TANF program and the population served, from states, the District of Columbia, and the U.S. territories. Local, state, and federal decisions are informed by the reports on TANF work participation rates, time-limit data, and caseload data. Quality assurance and quality control of TANF data are essential components of a strong data system.

Idea Lab 4: Show Me the Money: How States Spend TANF and MOE Funds

Peter Germanis, Office of Family Assistance, will provide an overview of newly released TANF/MOE financial data for FY 2014. He will review trends over time, particularly the drop in spending on core TANF program components and activities, and examine the possible implications.

Idea Lab 5: Developmental Needs: Serving Young Adults and Parents of Infants in TANF

Elizabeth Lower-Basch, CLASP, will highlight recent work on how TANF can best serve the developmental needs of two overlapping groups of TANF recipients: young adults and parents of infants. Ms. Lower-Basch will highlight improvements that can be made within TANF cash assistance and work programs, as well as ways to collaborate with other programs, such as the Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act's (WIOA) youth programs and Maternal Infant and Early Childhood Home Visiting programs.

Idea Lab 6: Strategic Partnerships: Office of Community Services – Assets for Independence

Jennifer Medina, CFED, will discuss resources that encourage financial and economic asset building for TANF recipients and low-income individuals. ACF has encouraged human service agencies to integrate financial services and asset development into their programs. This Idea Lab will highlight an interactive resource guide, Building Financial Capability: A Planning Guide for Integrated Services. This guide provides step-by-step procedures to develop a plan to assist TANF recipients and other low-income individuals to develop assets.

Idea Lab 7: Program for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIACC)

Kyo Sin Kang from American Institutes for Research will provide an overview of the Program for the International Assessment of Adult Competencies (PIAAC) Survey of Adult Skills and ways participants can access PIAAC data to help plan for adult and basic education services. PIAAC Online Tools exhibit will showcase tools and resources accessible through the PIAAC Gateway. International research has found declining literacy rates among Americans. Improving individual literacy is key to improving employment outcomes.

Idea Lab 8: Strategic Partnerships: U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development

Jayme Brown from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) will provide information on HUD's self-sufficiency programs and HUD's future priorities around interagency partnerships. TANF and HUD have consistently worked together to improve housing and economic outcomes for families. This session will provide information on how states and communities can create strong interagency partnerships.

Idea Lab 9: Executive Skills: A New Lens for Helping TANF Recipients to Set and Achieve Goals

LaDonna Pavetti, Center for Budget and Policy Priorities (CBPP), will highlight the emergence of an ever-growing body of research on the importance of individuals' executive skills in achieving individual goals and experiencing employment success. The research provides a new lens to use when working with customers. This session will explore the concept of executive skills and it can be incorporated into case management and service delivery.

Idea Lab 10: Improving Business Processes for Delivering Work Supports for Low-Income Families: Findings from the Work Support Strategies Evaluation

Heather Hahn, Urban Institute, will discuss evaluation findings from the experiences of the six states involved in the Work Support Strategies initiative as they worked to streamline and integrate their delivery of work supports including SNAP, Medicaid, and child care. Families are often challenged in accessing services by having to provide information multiple times and to apply and re-certify for benefits at different locations or through different processes. The Urban Institute examined the states' strategies for diagnosing problems and developing solutions, the changes states made the factors that facilitated or hindered the change process, and the effects of the changes on program efficiency and client well-being.

Idea Lab 11: Strategic Partnerships: Office of Refugee Resettlement

While refugees and immigrants represent a small proportion of the TANF caseload, they often require specialized services. The development of strategic partnerships among TANF, workforce development, and refugee serving organizations have shown promise in improving employment outcomes for refugees and immigrants. Mariestella Fischer, Assistant to the Director, Office of Refugee Resettlement, will provide an overview of relevant state and local programs.

Recent activity, including subcommittee hearings and a draft TANF proposal in the House Ways and Means Committee, indicate that Congressional action on TANF reauthorization may be a real possibility. Key staff from Senate Finance and House Ways and Means committees will discuss prospects for reauthorization, Congressional priorities for reform, provisions of current proposals, and possible timelines.
