



Welfare Reform

- In 1996, Congress created the Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) program.
- TANF replaced previous programs, including AFDC- Aid to Families with Dependent Children.
- The new legislation also resulted in a \$16.5 billion a year block grant program.
- States and Territories were given wide flexibility to develop and implement their own assistance programs, subject to restrictions such as:
 - Requirements to meet minimum levels of participation in work or work-related activities; and
 - Federal time limits on assistance

TANF Program Purpose

Jurisdictions can use TANF funds for cash assistance programs and other expenditures reasonably calculated to accomplish at least one of the four statutory TANF purposes.

- (1) Provide assistance to needy families so that children may be cared for in their own homes or in the homes of relatives
- (2) End the dependence of needy parents on government benefits by promoting job preparation, work and marriage
- (3) Prevent and reduce the incidence of out-of-wedlock pregnancies
- (4) Encourage the formation and maintenance of two-parent families



TANF Rules: Individuals

- Eligibility criteria (income, family make-up, citizenship status)
- Time limits
- Work Requirements
- Child support and paternity cooperation
- Other


