Receive financial and medical support for your children

When You Open a Child Support Case:

The court will establish an order for financial and medical support, as well as custody and visitation.

You will have to appear in court with the other parent or participate in a negotiation meeting at a child support office.

Your physical address will be printed on child support documents and could be accessed by the other parent.

There Are Steps You Can Take To Protect Yourself And Your Children.

Tell child support staff about your safety concerns.

Ask child support staff about safety measures that can be in place for your court date.

Ask about family violence protections and keeping your address confidential.
