



American Indian Children Entering Care FY05-FY13

Nationally, both the percent and number of American Indian children entering care began to steadily increase during FY10 and continued through FY13.




Reasons Children Enter Out-of-Home Care (FY13)

American Indian Children Entering Care, by Age (FY05 to FY13)


Nationally the number of AIAN Children entering care increased for younger children.






Percent of Children Entering Care, by Age and Race (FY13)

American Indian babies comprised a larger precentage of children entering care.



Number and Percent of American Indian Children with a Non-Permanent Exit (FY05-FY13)

A non-permanent exit includes youth aging out of care. During FY13, 13% (or 1,220 AIAN children) of American Indian youth, formerly in care, exited care without achieving permanency.
