Tribal Suggestions to facilitate TTANF program Startup -

- 1. Look up the state's TANF plan on their web site for information re: payment amounts, resource limits, etc.
- 2. Through the RO, request a good model plan. You'll want to focus on your tribe's situation and goals, but a successful model can help ensure that nothing is forgotten. You may also want to send a draft plan to the RO; this can save a lot of time later.
- 3. Be sure that roles are clear within tribal government, which agency/dept will handle TANF. Also how TANF will interact with other programs such as NEW, economic development, CSE, etc.
- 4. Be sure to do a Policy Manual based on the TFAP. Remember that the TFAP can be vitally important when a case decision is questioned by the Council or others.
- 5. Allow plenty of time to get on the Council calendar, probably several times. Also, remember the 90-day notification for the state.
- 6. Remember the admin cost agreement with ACF.
- 7. It's up to you to check out the possibility of state MOE.
- 8. Maintain close, regular contact with your RO contact. This will help ensure that no one forgets anything.
- 9. Tribal (and state) TANF programs are dynamic; they change and evolve. Work with your RO to ensure that a proposed change is allowable and that any TFAP amendments can be approved quickly.

Discussion Questions -

- 1. Did you encounter caseloads that differed from your original estimates? How did you respond to this challenge?
- 2. Were there infrastructure or systems (e.g., computers, telecommunications, and office space) challenges you encountered during program start-up?
- 3. What your experience in collaborating with other programs? Did you encounter any cross-program coordination barriers?

- 4. Did/does anyone use state TANF information systems for data collection and/or reporting? What's been your experience with this type of collaboration?
- 5. If you developed your own information system, what were some of the most important considerations that went into its development?
- 6. After implementing your Tribal TANF program, did you elect to contract with states or other service providers for selected TANF services or operations? Long-term basis? Short-term basis?
- 7. What local community assets and/or partners did you find to be beneficial to the program during start-up?
