

What is Secondary Migration?



- Refugees move to states other than the state in which they were initially resettled or placed.
- Refugees have the right to relocate at any time to any state upon arrival, but services such as location of housing, assistance with rent, assistance with registration at public schools and application for public benefits are only available through the initial refugee resettlement agency.

Drivers of Secondary Migration



- Join family or friends
- Established ethnic community
- Better job opportunities
- Affordable housing lower cost of living
- Better public service benefits


Impacts of Secondary Migration



- Difficult jobs are filled. Example: Meat Packing. There is often high turn-over
- Initial resettlement money does not follow refugees
- There may not be refugee-serving agencies
- May bypass resettlement agencies
- Community not prepared
- Lack of affordable housing, schools, government benefits
- ORR has funding to support communities with secondary migration

State Refugee Coordinator's Role



- Minnesota leads nation in secondary migration: 2,000 initial resettlements + 2,000 secondary migrants each year
- Gus Avenido meets with school leadership, housing providers, benefits providers, English as second language (ESL providers), and law enforcement to plan a strategy
- Community Connectors are hired as liaisons for community stakeholders

What is a Welcoming City or County?

Welcoming America defines a Welcoming City or County as a community that:

PLANS: All relevant sectors, such as government, business, non-profit, and others are engaged to work together to create a welcoming community climate that supports long-term integration.

COMMITS: Commitments are made to institutionalize strategies that ensure the ongoing inclusion and long-term economic and social integration of newcomers.

BUILDS COMMUNITY: Newcomers and long-time residents are engaged to find common ground and shared leadership.

COMMUNICATES: Messages of unity and shared values permeate the community through the media, through the voice of leaders, and among residents.

SUSTAINS: Policies and practices are considered in order to ensure that interactions between new and longer-term Americans remain positive ones and the community's economic vitality remains strong.

Engaging the Receiving Community

Leadership

Engage credible, mainstream leaders to help foster a positive climate.

Contact

Foster meaningful connections between U.S. born and foreign-born.

Communications

Provide an alternative to divisive rhetoric about newcomers through messages that speak to unity, common values, and shared contributions.

Uniting Parents at Schools




- Fostering bilingual dialogues at diverse schools to bring together parents and build unity and involvement.

Current Partnership Profile

about programs available to families. (i.e. meet with crossservice provider staff routinely to share information, produce a newsletter or brief about the needs and services available to refugees, information and referral efforts in the city for refugees, etc)

Share information

Staff from your agencies work on projects together to improve each other's services. (i.e. received a grant that supports multiple agencies individual work, improved outreach awareness efforts together, etc.) Level 3

We have changed some rules in the community for serving refugees.

(i.e. targeted families are first-in-line for services, staff from service providers are co-located, hours or locations of services have changed to be more convenient, etc)

Level 4

We have **changed the "system" of services that affect or support refugees** in our community. (i.e. significant funding has been redirected, staff from separate agencies are crosstrained, governing bodies of organizations have adopted policy changes, etc.)


