Dr. **Michelle Derr** is a senior researcher at Mathematica Policy Research. She has more than 15 years of experience studying employment and training programs for TANF recipients and other disadvantaged populations. During her career, she has interviewed nearly 600 welfare recipients and visited employment and training programs in about 100 communities in more than half the states and the District of Columbia. She has a passion for producing high-quality research that is useful to TANF policymakers and program administrators.

Brendan Kelly is a Senior Social Science Research Analyst and the Dissemination Team Leader in the Office of Planning, Research and Evaluation, Administration for Children and Families in the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Brendan's research focuses on improving public policies for low-income children and their families. He currently serves as the lead federal project officer for the ACF's Innovative Strategies for Increasing Self-Sufficiency demonstration and evaluation (ISIS) and co-lead on ACF's new research portfolio in behavioral economics - BIAS. Prior to his service at the Department of Health and Human Services, Brendan previously worked at the U.S. Department of Labor as a Truman Fellow. Brendan received his Master of Public Administration degree from the Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University in 2001 and a Master of Arts degree from Columbia University. He is a 1999 graduate from St. John's University (MN) where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree summa cum laude, All-College Honors, and Distinction in Political Science and Peace Studies.

Kinsey Dinan is Deputy Director of the New York City Human Resources Administration's Office of Evaluation and Research. Through program evaluations, primary research, and policy analysis, she informs agency programming related to cash assistance, SNAP, child support, and other areas. Prior to joining HRA, she was a Senior Policy Associate at Columbia University's National Center for Children in Poverty, working in collaboration with state policymakers, administrators, and researchers to improve supports for low-income working families.
